Celebrating success and welcoming the opportunities of the terms ahead

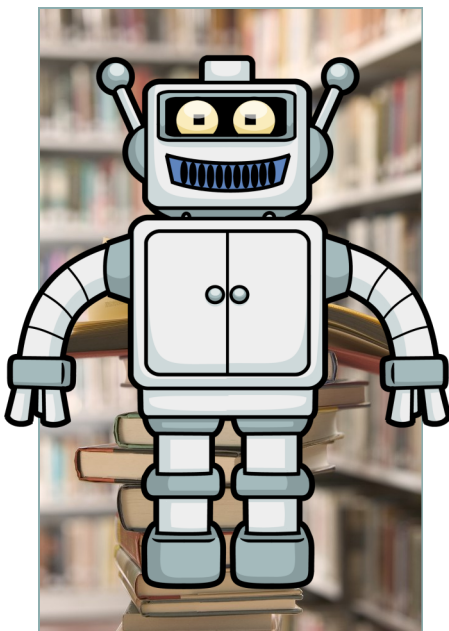
In November, we hosted our annual Aspirational Awards Evening, where we celebrated students with exceptional dedication and strong academic progress, with over 70 prizes in total. For our whole school community, this event reinforced the value in working hard, being committed to your learning and striving to improve and excel. These are lessons I hope all our students are taking into 2018 as they approach their next round of assessments – not least our Year 11s in their hugely important GCSEs.

Academic progress is our central focus at Amington, but we also want our students to have the best opportunities outside school as well as in the classroom. We know that school is an investment in your children to make sure that they have everything they need to succeed, and this includes wider life skills, experiences and understanding.

So, later this year, students will be visiting Cern, the home of the Large Hadron Collider in Switzerland, to see how physics theory meets real-world application. Others will be camping and taking part in outward bound activities, or touring top London theatres as part of performing arts. Opportunities like these crystallise what can be achieved when combining talent with hard work.

Last term, one of our most rewarding and enjoyable initiatives was a series of Year 5 mastery classes for local primary pupils. These were designed to introduce pupils to key learning concepts – from exploring poetry and metaphor in English and performing complex maths calculations correctly. The Year 5 Festival in October allowed over 200 Year 5s to join us at Amington for a taste of secondary school life, and we will be welcoming over 200 more next month in our next series of masterclasses. Amington's greatest asset is its dedicated teachers who put on such amazing activities.

The feedback from the Year 5 children, their parents and staff was brilliant and we look forward to welcoming many of them back in the autumn when they begin their school applications. For the moment though, we are very excited to receive those Year 6 pupils who have been successful in gaining a place here at Amington for September, as part of our new, oversubscribed Year 7 cohort. While starting secondary school can be daunting for children, we begin our transition process early so that pupils have all they need to start the year with confidence.



STEM DAY—TECHNOLOGY

On Thursday 1st March over 50 Year 9 Students took part in an external STEM Day, run by The “Smallpeice Trust”. The Trust’s aim is to promote the importance of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) for future options and career paths. The students took part in the day by learning the importance of engineering by designing and creating an autonomous self-driving vehicle using LEGO mindstorm kits. By working in small groups they develop and communicate their design from the page to creating and programming the vehicle and then finally presenting the final design to the rest of the groups. All the groups really enjoyed the day and loved working and programming their creations.

The winning team and the team who impressed the most with one aspect of their work have now been given an opportunity to represent the academy on the 26th June at the Lichfield Cathedral school on another project competing against other schools in the area.

Many of the students who took part commented on how good the day was and the representative of the “Smallpeice Trust” who delivered the workshop commented on how good our students were; the winning design being one of the best he had seen!

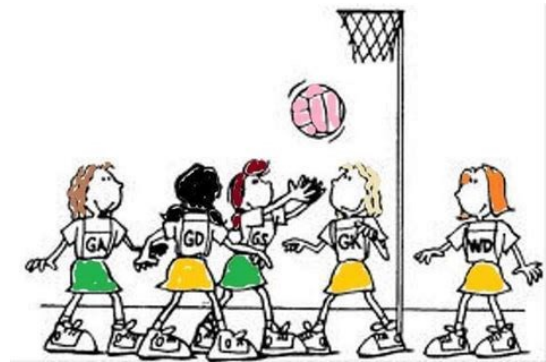
Rugby

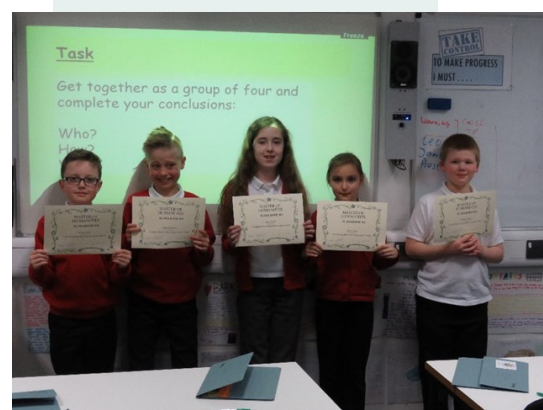
BOOK FAIR IN THE LRC

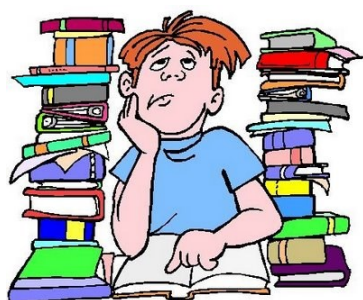
