YEAR 7 STEM AND FLOODING WORKSHOP

As part of the World of Work Day, 60 Year 7 students took part in a Geography STEM Day. Students had 3 challenges to complete throughout the day.

For challenge 1, students learntedabout Nepal. In the Himalayas, one challenge facing farmers is transporting their crops down the mountainside and across rivers. Students worked in teams

to design a method of transporting tomatoes from one side of the mountain (two desks) to the other. Teams created a variety of designs, most of which were successful ,and a few teams even created a model of a gravity ropeway system, just like farmers would use in real life.

For challenge 2, students learnt about Kenya, where water is often sourced from wells. Students had to design and create a wind turbine capable of raising and lowering a bucket (a plastic cup) out of a well. Throughout the day teams were designing better and bigger wind turbines capable of lifting greater amounts of water.



For the final challenge ,students learned bout Ethiopia, where diseases spread easily because children cannot easily wash their hands before school or before having dinner. Teams were given garden canes, string, bottles and sellotape and needed to design a model capable of both collecting and dispensing rain water. The models were tested outside and teams explained how their models worked.

On Friday 25th June 2018 Y7 students took part in a flooding workshop run by the Environment Agency and Stafford Fire Service. The main aim of the session was to get students thinking about what happens during a flood, how they would be affected and what they could do to prepare. The main activity was an interactive snakes and ladders game developed by Lancaster University, with some discussion questions before and after. At the end of the session, students wrote their own personal flood plan which they could take home to complete and discuss with their parents.

YEAR 8 MONOLOGUES

Earlier this term we challenged every Year 8 student to perform a monologue to two members of Amington's Senior Leadership Team. Not only this, but they were then required to answer some questions about their

performance too. All of this... completely on their own! The purpose of this was to push the students out of their comfort zone, developing presentation skills that they can take forward into their GCSE speaking exams, job interviews, and future careers.

The whole year group worked extremely hard to present the best performances they could, memorising up to a full page of lines and learning the full context of the plays to further inform their characterisation. Watching the students develop so much in confidence in such a short time has been an amazing experience. There was initial daunting wave of "How am I going to walk into a room and talk to teachers on my own?" yet weeks later, we had students producing extremely high quality drama pieces, surprising themselves with what they can do when they really put their mind to something.

During enrichment week, 40 students and the Performing Arts team ,travelled down to London for two amazing days. Firstly, our budding actors attended a workshop led by the Resident Director of The Lion King UK Tour, Tim English! Alongside this, our dancers developed a dance choreographed by an ensemble performer from The Lion King -Julien Roussel! Both professional workshops allowed the students to experience a genuine sense of what it is like to be a working performer.

That evening, the students watched the incredible *Lion King* at the Lyceum Theatre. This developed the students' understanding and awareness of combining the disciplines of performing arts to create an overall performance. Many said it was the best thing they had ever seen at the theatre.

The next morning, we had a backstage tour of Shakespeare's Globe, learning the history of the theatre and interesting facts about the performance conditions at the time. We were lucky enough to watch part of a real rehearsal for Shakespeare's *Othello* with professional actors, including Academy Award and BAFTA award winning Mark Rylance!

CREATURAMA

Anthony James from CREATURAMA was invited in to work with Year 8 on Monday and Tuesday during Enrichment week. He explained how he trained to do the job and shared stories from his life working for theatres, games companies, Blue Peter, CBBC, Dr Who and most recently 'Jurassic World – Fallen Kingdom'. Anthony spoke about the ups and downs of pursuing your dreams and about the responsibility and commitment

expected of you to succeed in the TV and Film Industry.

worked with enthusiasm and asked lots of interesting questions, partly about education/work/careers but also about how to improve the design they were working on. The dinosaurs created varied from small anatomically correct creatures to huge creations with moveable parts such as jaws. Throughout the day the students displayed enthusiasm and during both days Anthony James was impressed by the creativity displayed. By the end of each day students creating


outstanding pieces of work or showing teamwork and readiness to help – such as tidying beyond their own working area – were awarded with original dinosaur designs drawn by Anthony James.

GENEVA

Students from Landau Forte Amington have been inspired by a visit to Geneva, home of the UN, CERN and the Large Hadron Collider.

During the visit on 2nd July, the students discovered how CERN is helping to answer some of the most fundamental questions: How did the Universe begin? What are the basic building blocks of matter?

Scientific breakthroughs such as the discovery of the Higgs boson require experimental machines on the large scale, and the students gained an appreciation of the technical and engineering challenges that the multinational experimental collaborations at CERN face.

The UK has been a member of CERN since the organisation was founded in 1954. Membership allows British researchers to take a wide variety of roles that contribute to CERN's on-going success; from recently qualified technicians and university undergraduates gaining their first taste of working in an international environment to PhD students analysing experimental data and experienced engineers and physicists leading projects or representing their experimental collaborations. The Landau Forte Amington students' visit was led by a member of the CERN community who talked from personal experience about their contribution to CERN's research programme.

STFC's Executive Chair, Professor Mark Thomson, said "The scale of the science and technology at CERN is awe-inspiring. There is no doubt that seeing it at first hand, and meeting the people who work on the experiments, can influence young people's future education and career choices."

Mrs Sterling, a science tutor from Landau Forte Amington said, 'Meeting the scientists at CERN has inspired our students and helped deepen their understanding of Physics. They've all decided they want to work at either CERN or the UN now!'

NATIONAL MEMORIAL ARBORETUM— 'THANK YOU YOUTH FESTIVAL'

To commemorate 100 years since the ending of WWI, the National Memorial Arboretum held a day of workshops and activities themed around the First World War. We took a group of J10 and J9 students to take part.

Our first activity was called 'Songs of the Centenary' and focused on turning stories of people from the war into simple poetry and music. The students really threw themselves into this activity and in just a few minutes came up with some really creative and interesting bits of poetry to reflect the experiences of wartime.

The second activity was more hands on, using clay to make tiles representing 'Dazzle Camouflage'. This was a WWI technique to confuse submarines by obscuring the sides of a ship with geometric patterns and shapes. Again, the students got involved and made some interesting designs which were put together to form a big overall pattern.

Finally, our last activity was in the 'Landscapes of Life' exhibition. This is a series of exhibits focused on how and why people remember. The students had different task sheets to complete and had to find the answers among the information and objects around the exhibition. Once again, the students were engaged and active in finding the answers and learning more about the different ways that remembrance can take place.

Overall, the conduct of the students all day was excellent. They behaved calmly and maturely and engaged actively with each task they were given and really showed themselves and the school in a positive way. Many students also took the chance to explore other parts of the arboretum whilst we had our lunch break, again showing their maturity and understanding of the importance of remembrance.
