The inspectors highlighted that Amington is well on the way to being judged a good school, and we look forward to welcoming them back soon to confirm this.

It has been fantastic to see the academy community join in so enthusiastically with our efforts to support various incredibly worthwhile causes. We have raised significant amounts for notable charities, including Children in Need and the St Giles

Hospice. I am very impressed with how our students have taken to these causes and we are all very proud of the compassion and generosity shown by our community.

We have further good news when it comes to academy recruitment. I am delighted to announce that in January we will welcome a new Deputy Faculty Leader for Maths, a Lead Practitioner in Science, and a Key Stage Leader in English. These colleagues will add experience and expertise to our already talented staff group and will prove hugely important as we continue to move from strength to strength.

We take students' emotional wellbeing very seriously at the academy. As a result, we have enhanced our pastoral care to ensure every student feels safe and supported while at school by appointing two highly experienced Pastoral Leads. In addition, our Academy Counsellor has also been working with our students to fill the gap left by the reduction of health and support services in the community.

To complement our strong pastoral support, the academy has appointed a Child and Family Support Worker to liaise directly with the wider Amington community as we continue to live with the challenges of the pandemic. 

SCIENCE

This term in science, KS3 have read a research article about the effect of gut bacteria on the brain. Students have been discussing the benefits of certain bacteria in digestion and the harmful types of bacteria that cause disease.



They have seen how we can use mice as models for human behaviour, how to test the changes in behaviour caused by gut bacteria, and have drawn sections of DNA that were used to identify the different types of bacteria in the gut.

Pupils have then written about the article and drawn their own conclusions about the effects of gut bacteria on the brain. These conclusions include links between gut bacteria and the levels of anxiety, social behaviours, and memory, and have shown real criticality about the relevance of the results to humans.

KS3 have enjoyed reading and discussing the article together in class, learning about up-to-date research. The theme of bacteria leads smoothly into next term's journal article about viruses and their use in medicine!








One of William Green's responses to the YR11 'Close-Ups' inspired project

As part of their exam our Y11 BTEC Music has to complete a Showcase Unit and we




were delighted to be able to run this as a live event. The group organised the whole showcase from getting performance, organising light/sound/stage as well as refreshment stall and ticket sales.
